One of the many wonderful things about our festal celebrations is having all four parts in the choir. It is always so much easier to stay in tune with the basses there to anchor the chord. This is true for most singers, but even more so for those of us with an uncertain sense of pitch!

On Dormition, we celebrated the falling asleep and entry into Life of the Theotokos. She never lost her anchor amongst all the uncertainties of this life and she never got out of tune with her Son.

Sadly, we can not say this of ourselves. In our sinfulness, we have lost much of the spiritual “sense of pitch” that keeps us tuned to the things of God. So, God in His mercy provides other anchors to help us – the teachings of the Church, her services and sacraments, and the support of our brothers and sisters in Christ ... And, of course, He also gives us the Theotokos. Firmly anchored on her Son, she is an excellent and sure anchor for those of us who still suffer from various degrees of spiritual tone-deafness.

May we, with her, enter into the fullness of the Life of her Son!

Fr. Stephan, in a very beautiful sermon, spoke of this feast's being a celebration of the Theotokos' birth into the fullness of the Kingdom of her Son, where she shares in His radiant Light. We see this in the icon of the Dormition – Christ holds His mother as a baby girl and enfolds her in His radiance. So, it's a reversal of Christ's Nativity. She gave birth to Him in the flesh, and He gives her Life Eternal. For her to accept that life, she had to become like an infant. That meant trusting fully in her Son in the face of death – once and for all relinquishing every good thing of this world and the conscious control of her mind and body. Though this must have been daunting even for her, she did it, and so she was reborn into the fullness of the life of her Son.

From her life and death, we learn

- 1) we must approach God as little children
- 2) sooner or later, we must all face the unknown and the radical giving up of control that we will encounter in our death
- 3) we must be prepared to offer ourselves up to God in humility and thanksgiving.

Father then mentioned that the image of the mother giving life to her child through the milk of her body is the nearest example we have of how Christ feeds us with His own Flesh and Blood. The Theotokos is more like her Son in character than anyone else. Nobody but her Son can love more fully. We all need love, compassion, motherly care and nurturing, and we can receive this in a special way through the Theotokos and her Divine Son.
