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Dear Friends of Holy Assumption Monastery,

As this is being written, Pentecost and Sunday of All Saints are past, and we are coming up on the Feast of All Saints of North America. Our liturgical cycle is now basically "back to normal." The hope, though, is that our journey through Great Lent, Pascha, and Pentecost has reminded us that "normal" is anything but. Rather, we live in a world that the God-Man has transformed through His Incarnation, Crucifixion, Resurrection, and Ascension and through the coming of the Holy Spirit. Dem Bones, Dem Bones, Dem Dry Bones

We had another wonderful Friends' meeting! On Sunday, June 5, Fr. John Finley spoke to us on modern American burial practices in light of the Orthodox theology of the body. The majority of his talk was a fascinating and detailed Bible study on bones – starting with the Old Testament story of the dead man raised to life after being dropped into the grave containing the bones of the Prophet Elisha. Eve's oneness with Adam was seen in her being flesh of his flesh and bone of his bone. The risen Christ reveals that He has true flesh and bones, and we are members of Christ's flesh and bones.

Suffering and death are described in terms of separation of flesh and bones. Death is not the separation of the person and his body, but of soul and body. The priest prays "In the grave bodily; in Hades with Thy soul, though Thou wast God; in Paradise with the thief; and on the Throne with the Father and the Spirit wast Thou who fillest all things, O Christ the Uncircumscribable." So, Christ's Person is present in the grave, even in death.



Such a view of personhood helps us see why there are blessings for those who care for the bones of the departed and why it is considered a serious sin to dishonor their bones by scattering or crushing them. This in turn sheds light on the Orthodox opposition to cremation [which involves burning the flesh from the bones and crushing the bones (which remain relatively intact and therefore must be crushed)] and to scattering the person's ashes.

Fr. John then switched gears to give some practical comments on why more people are choosing cremation, how to make burials less prohibitively expensive, and how to be more involved ourselves in burying our loved ones. etc. Burying the dead is one of the traditional "corporal works of mercy." The implication is that we should not just pay for funerals, but actually be personally involved. Some of those present have had the blessing of helping to bury their loved ones, and they attested to what a blessing it was.
