### DECEMBER FRIENDS MEETING



Sr. Margarete – What do you mean, I talk with my hands?

At our December 8 Friends' meeting, Sr. Margarete spoke on *Wherefore Man and Woman: Exploring the Purpose of Sexual Duality in Mankind and Its Implications for the Ordination of Women to the Priesthood*. The talk examined what our maleness or femaleness has to do with our humanity, and how that impinges on the question of women in the priesthood. Sr. Margarete gave an overview of the Orthodox literature on the question, with special reference to five well known authors who have been major participants in the debate – Mme Elizabeth Behr-Sigal, Dr. Valerie Karras, Sister Nonna (Verna) Harrison, Fr. Thomas Hopko, and Fr. John Behr.

Everyone agrees that there is a Patristic consensus that men and women are equally made according to the image of God, but there is sharp disagreement on whether the Fathers understood sex (in the sense of maleness or femaleness) to be 1) an intrinsic part of our humanity that will continue to be of importance in eternity or 2) simply for procreation in this fallen world and therefore destined to disappear or become thoroughly irrelevant in eternity. Those who hold the first view (Fr. Thomas and Fr. John) believe that maleness is intrinsically important to being a priest. Of those who hold the second view (Mme Behr-Sigal, Dr. Karras, and Sister Nonna), Mme Behr-Sigal and Dr. Karras think there is no intrinsic reason that only men should be priests because they believe there are no essential differences between them; Sister Nonna holds an intermediate view in which male priesthood has a metaphorical importance liturgically, but no true importance otherwise.

Sr. Margarete then looked at the strong and weak points of both sides, which space does not permit us to recap. What did become apparent, though, was the importance of looking at the entire Tradition of the Church – Scripture, the Fathers, the Liturgy, etc. – and finding a key to understanding them as a unified whole instead of solving apparent discrepancies by discounting certain teachings as due to cultural limitations. For example, Elizabeth Behr-Sigal thought that St. Paul got it "right" when he said that in Christ there is neither Greek nor Jew, slave nor free, male nor female (Gal. 3:28), but when he or the various Church Fathers talked of women submitting to their husbands, they were caving in to their societal standards. Of course, we can say that, but it puts us in the situation of thinking WE are able to discern what the great saints of the Church could not! So, again, the talk underlined the necessity of much more research in this area if we are truly to understand the Mind of the Church on this topic.

Once again, we had a lovely celebration of the Nativity of our Lord. We were particularly blessed to have Fr. John Ramos celebrate the Vesperal Liturgy of St. Basil on the Eve of the Nativity and Fr. John Schettig celebrate the St. John Chrysostom Liturgy on Christmas Day. They both helped us out greatly during our first year here. So, we were delighted to have them back with us at this important time of year. It was also wonderful to have many old and new friends share our meals and services. Thanks one and all for adding to the rich blessings of this beautiful feast!
