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Dear Friends of Holy Assumption Monastery,

When you ask a priest what his day looks like, you may get a reply something like “Hospital visits, then a funeral, then a wedding, then a baptism ...” At first glance, such a day seems jarring – how do priests manage to go back and forth between such happy and sad events? On reflection, though, there is a deep unity to such a day, and we find that unity in the meaning of baptism.

In baptism, we die with Christ in order to live with Him. There is, of course, great joy in baptizing somebody into new life in Christ, but we must not forget that our life in Christ is a life of continually dying to ourselves. This is beautifully seen in the wedding ceremony, where the hymn “O Holy Martyrs” is sung as the new couple is led around the table.

We live out this death to ourselves and life in Christ in our day-to-day world with the small joys and heartbreaks and the large ones, too – such as weddings, serious illness, and death. In the moments of joy, we must not forget that they are not sustainable without consciously choosing death to our own agendas and comfort. And in our moments of sorrow, we must remember that “Weeping may endure for a night, but joy comes in the morning” (Ps 30:5). That morning comes in part any time that we remember to turn our hearts towards God, but comes fully only in the Kingdom of Heaven.

As we prepare to celebrate our Lord's baptism this Theophany, may we indeed share in His death that we may share in the life of the unending Day of His Kingdom!

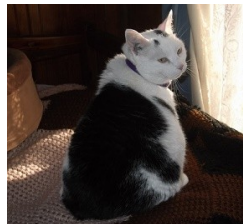

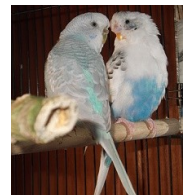


You've GOT to be kidding!

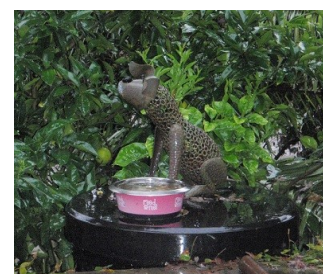
