## Today's Reflection -

#### Where do we find our worth?

A friend of ours had a disciplinary issue or two when she was young (like the rest of us!). Once, when her parents disciplined her after she had crossed their line, she said in a shocked voice, "Do you realize you're hurting my self-esteem?!"

Another friend of ours was a 6th-grade teacher. On the first day of classes one year, a very troubled (and troublesome) boy entered her class. She took one look at him and said to herself, "That boy is going to be my best friend." She immediately started asking him to help with various deeds, and he became both less troubled and less troublesome.

These anecdotes illustrate a major problem with our cultural emphasis on self-esteem — the way to be of true worth is not to esteem ourselves regardless of how we act, but to become a responsible human being in the context of loving and being loved. Our teacher friend knew this, which is why she gave that young boy many opportunities to serve others while making clear that she cared deeply about him. And it worked!

My own experience - as a child and as an adult working with children - has taught me the same thing. So, I hope that my books in some small way help cultivate that spirit of responsible service in the context of love. Let me know how I'm doing!



## Mother Melania's Book Update

We have been very blessed with three wonderful friends who have illustrated all of our kids' books so far. However, they do have actual lives that prevent them from illustrating every crazy book series I come up with. So, for a couple of years now, I have been taking classes on "How does a totally untalented person illustrate a children's book?" Finally, I have come up with a technique that (I think) works well enough to start with.

So, I put together some discussion questions, vocabulary helps, and coloring sheets that I thought you and your kids might find helpful. Tell me what you think!

## **PETER RABBIT - Discussion Questions**

- Why did Peter's mother tell him not to go into Mr. McGregor's garden?
  - His father died there and Mrs. McGregor put him in a rabbit pie.
- Why do you think Peter disobeyed his mother?
  - Maybe the food was tempting. Maybe he wanted to prove he was brave. Maybe he wanted to impress his brothers & sisters
- Why did Peter start feeling sick?
  - He ate too much
- Whom did Peter meet in the garden? What did he try to do to Peter?
  - Mr. McGregor.
  - He tried to catch Peter and probably wanted to eat him.
- Who helped Peter escape when he was caught in the gooseberry net? How?
  - friendly sparrows
  - They implored him to exert himself (they begged him to work hard to get free from the gooseberry net)
- How did Peter lose his jacket and shoes? What happened to them?
  - He lost his shoes among the vegetables.
  - He got caught by his jacket buttons by the gooseberry net and had to leave it so that he could get free
  - o Mr. McGregor picked them up and put them on a scarecrow
- What happened when Peter got home?
  - His mom sent him to bed and gave him some chamomile tea (to make him feel better)
  - o Flopsy, Mopsy, and Cottontail had bread, milk, and blackberries for supper
- What are some lessons Peter may have learned?
  - Listen to your mom!
  - o Eating too much of things you like can make you sick
  - o If you have self-control
    - you can avoid a lot of problems (like almost getting put in a rabbit pie!)
    - life is more pleasant later (like getting bread, milk, and blackberries for supper instead of being sent to bed early)
  - When you're in trouble
    - it helps to have encouraging friends
    - it's important to exert yourself (instead of just waiting for someone else to get you out of trouble)






