Dear Friends of Holy Assumption Monastery,

In September, we are blessed with two Great Feasts – the Nativity of the Theotokos and the Elevation of the Cross. In the service for the Nativity of the Theotokos, there is a beautiful verse that speaks of Christ as the Hope of the Hopeless, Who causes His mother to spring forth from a barren root. Christ is the one sure Hope, but He is not the Hope of those who still have hope in themselves, nor those who do not know themselves to be barren – in our case, not of children but of holiness.

On the Elevation of the Cross (and, in fact, every day at matins), we ask God to grant us “the invincible trophy, the weapon of peace.” Ironically, though, we must turn this invincible weapon towards our own souls and allow it to kill everything within ourselves that is not at peace with God. Then, we will see for ourselves why the Cross is the weapon of peace and invincible trophy.

We live in very uncertain times. Many of us constantly agonize over the economy, the war on terror, the deterioration of the moral fiber of our culture ... Yet while we still have hope in our goodness and ability to bring peace, our hopes will constantly be dashed and our peace remain insecure. However, to the degree that we come to terms with our own barrenness and our own lack of peace with God, we will be bearers of Christ and His peace to the world around us.




A VERY SPECIAL SUNDAY - OCTOBER 2

SEPTEMBER FRIENDS

On Sunday September 4, Vincent Rossi gave the 2nd part of his series on noetic prayer. Real prayer is body, mind, and spirit united in one energy before God. Everything before that is spiritual "calisthenics," designed to help us achieve true prayer. True prayer is communion of the mind with God, but the mind needs to be in a right state for that to happen, and because we are embodied beings, we must confront the passions of soul and body if we are to be attentive in prayer.

To do this, we must learn to govern with the attentive mind the two passible powers of the soul - anger and desire. These are not inherently bad (one should be angry over sin and desire God), but become passions when we focus on ourselves and not God. The person with true prayer so governs these powers that his mind is free from thoughts and images connected to the passions.



Wait, I can't write that fast!

If we spend our days focusing on ourselves and worldly concerns, we cannot expect to pray well. So, if we truly wish to pray, we must do nothing that is opposed to prayer so that God can truly draw near us. And thankfully, when we fail, there is repentance!

We are all grateful for this wonderful talk and eagerly looking forward to the 3rd and final part in November.


