Dear Friends of Holy Assumption Monastery,

Time flies! It seems we just got here, but we have just finished celebrating our second Dormition feast in our new home. This year's Feast was made even more special by having Bishop BENJAMIN with us for both Vigil and Divine Liturgy.

After the Liturgy, His Grace said a few words that we will always remember. He reminded us that we are both inheritors and caretakers of this beautiful monastery. This being the oldest Orthodox women's monastery in the United States, we are heirs to decades of prayers and toil of the nuns who lived and worked here, to the priests who served them, and to all those who helped support them and those who helped support Fr. Sergious in his restoration of the buildings and grounds.
