Dear Friends of Holy Assumption Monastery,

A cute internet story starts with a little girl asking her grandfather, “Who made me?” When he replies, “God made you,” she asks, “Well, then, who made YOU?” The grandfather answers, “God made me, too.” His granddaughter runs her hand over his wizened cheek and says, “He’s gotten better, hasn’t He?”

The humor here is a thin veil over profound tragedy. Feeling our own bodies breaking down over time is painful – and not just physically. Watching the same happening to our loved ones is even more unbearable.

Yet, what is the alternative? That God would permit us to have perfectly healthy bodies and ever more decrepit souls? The relationship of physical and spiritual illnesses is a complicated one. Many physical ailments are directly connected to spiritual ailments – you just have to look at ‘lifestyle’ diseases to see the truth of that. But even when the direct connection is not there, our physical ailments are a constant reminder that we live in a broken world. We can rage at the brokenness (especially at the broken people whose jagged edges rub on ours ☹), or we can humbly turn to God and seek healing for ourselves, our loved ones and all of creation. If we do the former, our souls sicken even faster and more calamitously than our bodies. If, however, we do the latter, then we will see what a remarkable Craftsman our God is. He takes us – decrepit of body and soul – and remakes us in His own likeness.

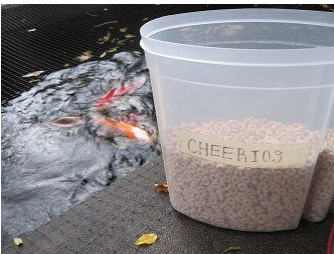

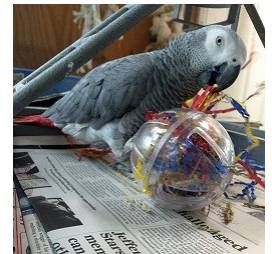
Koi – So much to eat, so little time!

Crackle - Food down there. Me up here. Time to correct that!



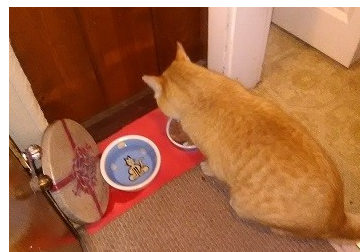
Petie - A toy AND a treat! What could be better?



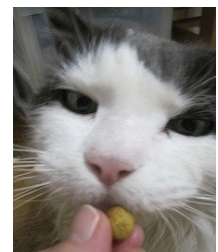
Balou – Hurry up and feed me already!
