Lavender is widely known for its calming and healing properties. I couldn't wait to visit the lavender field and take in the rich purple colors of the flowers and the scent wafting through the air.

I stayed overnight at the monastery because I travelled far and we had to depart by 5 am. I was surprised by the cool weather of Napa County and that the lavender field was on someone's private property. The landowners weren't even Orthodox and I was proud of how much the community adores and supports the nuns. I felt an abundance of generosity between the nuns and the community. The nuns have always been very generous to their local community by serving in a variety of ways. Here their community was showing up for them by offering as much lavender as we wanted.

It was also an excellent opportunity to say the Jesus Prayer silently as we worked. I worked alongside other nuns and volunteers. Next time I plan to invite a bunch of friends who would really enjoy it.

After we finished, we returned to the monastery and quickly changed out of our lavender scented clothes. There were lavender buds all over my room, no matter how hard I tried to keep it tidy. My room smelled heavenly.

It was hard work and well worth it. The scenery of the lavender fields was gorgeous, and the time went by quickly. God's creation is so beautiful. I feel extremely blessed to volunteer this year and I'm looking forward to the next harvest. I hope you can join us and invite your friends.


